Selection of a Monitoring, Evaluation and Knowledge Production Assistant of the Regional Program for the Integration of Agricultural Markets (PRIMA)

1. Background

The governments of the Republic of Benin and the Republic of Togo have agreed with IFAD to establish a regional framework for reflection of which objective is to boost agricultural production through increased agricultural trade between the two countries. The aim is to intensify intra-community trade within ECOWAS in line with the long-term vision of an African Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA).

The Regional Agricultural Market Integration Program (PRIMA) responds to requests from the governments of Benin and Togo for a regional agricultural market integration program in the spirit of the African Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA) at the sub-regional and continental levels. Both countries emphasize the need for a more integrated agricultural trade area, particularly to better strengthen their position in key ECOWAS trade corridors and in line with the African Union's 2063 Agenda and NEPAD's sectoral strategy.

The design of PRIMA was based on (i) lessons learned from the implementation of IFAD programs in Benin and Togo; (ii) the political priorities and development strategies of the two countries; (iii) the United Nations' SDGs and IFAD's strategic and political priorities; (iv) the African Union's 2063 Agenda; and (v) information exchanges with other technical and financial partners.

PRIMA was approved by the IFAD Executive Board in December 2020.

2. Brief presentation of the program

PRIMA's overall objective is to stimulate regional agricultural trade to create jobs for women and youth, increase incomes, and improve food security and nutrition for the rural poor.

The development objective is to support the sustainable transformation of family farming in Benin and Togo by improving the performance of sub-regional trade hubs and cross-border transport corridors while promoting rural entrepreneurship for youth and women, and fully integrating smallholders into national and sub-regional markets.

PRIMA will be implemented through two national projects (PRIMA-Benin and PRIMA-Togo) over a six-year period (2022-2028), with a particular focus on cross-border trade corridors shared by the two countries and other ECOWAS countries. The regional dimension of PRIMA will be coordinated by a regional technical assistance unit (UniRAT) housed within the Regional Agency for Agriculture and Food (RAAF) based in Lomé, Togo. It will mainly support the actions of regional coordination, monitoring-evaluation and knowledge management, market integration, policy dialogue and implementation of citizen engagement.

The program has three technical components and a fourth component for coordination and fiduciary management. The technical components are: i) Market integration and rural entrepreneurship; ii) Transformation of family farming adapted to climate change; iii) Policy dialogue and citizen engagement.

Component 1: Market Integration and Rural Entrepreneurship

Component 1 will support activities aimed at improving the performance of existing logistics and marketing infrastructure that facilitates the flow of agricultural products in subregional and cross-border trade corridors by (i) opening up rehabilitated production areas to regional agricultural markets with consistent and permanent accessibility (rural roads), (ii) rehabilitating and improving the quality of existing semi-wholesale markets, (iii) ensuring sustainable management and maintenance of public economic infrastructure, (iv) strengthening the entrepreneurial capacities of youth, women and FOs involved in this regional initiative.

Component 2: Transformation of family farming adapted to climate change

Component 2 is composed of the following three sub-components: (i) Sustainable management of transboundary watersheds; (ii) Development and sustainable management of small-scale irrigation

schemes; (iii) Improvement of family nutritional security and support to the integration of women. The potential areas of intervention will be specified during the formulation mission. This component will develop synergy and complementarity with IFAD's current project portfolio by focusing on agro-entrepreneurship.

Component 3. Political Dialogue and Citizen Engagement

This component aims to strengthen regional economic integration, including the participation of farmers' organizations in ECOWAS decision-making bodies and other regional mechanisms for steering agricultural market strategies at the cross-border level. The program will help alleviate trade policy constraints related to interregional trade, particularly non-customs policies. This approach will help identify regulatory gaps (standards, agricultural product quality).

The objective of this component is to build the capacity of PRIMA's target groups and key partners at all levels to advocate for public policies more conducive to market integration. One set of activities will be related to data collection, studies, and analysis to define a policy dialogue agenda. The other will focus on building the capacity of stakeholders to better monitor and evaluate PRIMA implementation with regular proposals on improvements and lessons learned to be integrated into the policy dialogue (citizen engagement).

The Program will support the integration of more efficient and effective cross-border territorial markets within regional trade corridors leading to a structural transformation of market-oriented family farming to ensure better income for 90,000 vulnerable rural households (516,000 people). Regional trade integration will be achieved through significant investments in the development of a coherent network of economic infrastructure including the rehabilitation and sustainable management of nine cross-border semi-wholesale markets and 18 territorial collection centers and 500 km of rural roads. The beneficiaries will be involved in the management and maintenance. The opening up of the production basins and the growing demand resulting from this regional network of rehabilitated markets will be met by a 30% increase in production (rice, market gardening, associated crops) which will be made possible by the development of climate-resilient agriculture on 16,000 ha of sub-watershed land surrounding 4,000 ha of plains and lowlands. It will also facilitate cross-border natural resource management.

Effective policy dialogue, enriched with timely and inclusive citizen feedback mechanisms, will enable PRIMA to be more strategic, systemic and inclusive. It will do this by (i) filling gaps in existing regional and national policies (i.e., removing physical and non-physical barriers to effective cross-border agricultural trade between the two countries); and (ii) expanding access to other major regional and intra-regional markets for the benefit of small and vulnerable producers, especially youth and women.

From a policy perspective, the program will take a more comprehensive approach necessary for deeper cross-border integration. Indeed, improving infrastructure and facilitating trade procedures are important to boost agricultural trade, as products are perishable and can be quickly affected by inefficient customs or lack of infrastructure. In addition, non-tariff measures will also be needed to boost intra- and extra-regional trade in both countries by harmonizing rules of origin and standards, as well as product standards in line with ECOWAS and WAEMU guidelines. The provision of technical assistance to individual firms (especially small and medium-sized exporters) is essential to help firms comply with regional and international standards. This is vital to improve the quality of exported products and in the production of goods that can be sold on regional and international markets. It is essential to make rules and procedures more transparent on customs websites to reduce the costs of non-tariff barriers and thus allow for easier and more efficient implementation.

The inclusion of youth, women and people with disabilities to benefit from increased business opportunities will involve program activities related to entrepreneurship training and business plan financing for 540 "agripreneurs" and 1,200 initiatives through rural youth and women's cooperatives.

The program's specific set of pro-nutrition and gender-specific activities, including for women's land rights, gender-sensitive value chains (i.e. moringa, peanut butter) and enterprises (rice processing), as well as the expected increase in income from trade integration areas, will be conducive to improving family food, nutrition and food security of targeted households.

3. Roles/Responsibilities

Reporting to the Regional Coordinator, the Monitoring and Evaluation Assistant will work in collaboration with the Monitoring and Evaluation Department of the Regional Agency for Agriculture and Food (RAAF). He/she will be responsible for planning, monitoring and evaluation activities and capitalizing on the Program's achievements.

The position will be based in Lomé, Togo at the ECOWAS Regional Agency for Agriculture and Food (RAAF).

As such, its duties and responsibilities fall under five (5) major headings:

a) Planning and monitoring of program activities

- Supports the preparation of the annual, semi-annual and quarterly work plan and budget while defining a performance measurement framework for the program at the outset;
- Regularly monitors these plans, identifies implementation difficulties and proposes recommendations for improvement;
- Prepares and organizes program activity review meetings and provides results matrices;
- Supports the implementation teams and builds their capacity to monitor activities;
- Coordinates field monitoring missions and follows up on recommendations;
- Ensures the application of the provisions contained in the program implementation manuals and procedures in force;
- Provides support for the administrative execution of the program;
- Undertakes, in agreement with the Coordinator, any other initiative in relation to monitoring and evaluation, likely to promote the efficiency and good execution of the Program;
- Ensure documentation and archiving of the program;
- Perform any other duties as assigned by the RAAF.

b) Monitoring of performance indicators and coordination of reporting

- Defines a program performance measurement framework consistent with ECOWAP indicators;
- Informs and analyzes performance indicators;
- Develops methodological and capacity building tools for monitoring, evaluation, capitalization and knowledge management;
- Coordinates the preparation of various mandate reports, quarterly/semi-annual/annual/final program reports;
- Uses the monitoring and evaluation software (MESECOPS, ECOWAP M&E platform, etc.) used by the ECOWAS Department of Agriculture or required by IFAD;
- Contribute in general to the ECOWAS Agricultural Policy EM system (ECOWAP).

c) Coordination of monitoring missions (supervision, field visits, etc.) and baseline, mid-term and final evaluations)

- Prepares independent evaluation missions and supports planned commissioned evaluations (ToR, documentation, field visit);
- Manages the evaluation process, ensures report quality and shares;
- Ensures implementation of recommendations;
- Facilitates the conduct of annual technical audits of the Program.

d) Conducting impact studies on the beneficiaries of the Program's actions

- Prepare the planned impact evaluation missions (ToR, recruitment of consultants, methodology, field study, etc.);
- Organizes and facilitates impact evaluation studies on beneficiaries as well as on the

sustainability of the Program.

e) Capitalization and Knowledge Management

- Develops and implements, in conjunction with the RAAF Communications Expert, an effective knowledge management strategy, ensuring the capitalization and dissemination of achievements, successes and failures (selection of information to be capitalized, learning events, exchange networks, dissemination of good practices through various media and communication channels, etc.)

4. Qualifications, experience, skills

Qualifications

Have a university degree of at least BAC+ 4 in agronomy agricultural economics, rural development, economics, agronomy, statistics or any related discipline.

Experiences

- At least eight (5) years of experience in planning, monitoring and evaluation in agricultural development or resilience projects;
- Have experience in capitalizing on the achievements of agricultural projects
- Have experience in the field of agricultural sectors
- Have experience in impact evaluations.

Skills

- Knowledge of the agricultural sector in the West African region;
- Experience in managing monitoring and evaluation databases for complex programs involving multiple countries;
- Have prior knowledge of statistical analysis, quantitative and qualitative data collection, processing and analysis;
- Strong familiarity with results-based management and logical frameworks;
- Good organizational skills, synthesis and writing skills;
- Excellent technical writing skills with a focus on regular reporting in accordance with donor requirements;
- Have a very good command of office automation tools (Word, Excel, PowerPoint, Publisher, etc.);
- Knowledge of tracking software is an asset; Proven writing skills;
- Familiarity with a multicultural work environment; Fluency in French and good knowledge of English.

5. General conditions for the mission

- The consultant will be based in Lomé, Togo, at the headquarters of the Regional Agency for Agriculture and Food;
- The duration of the contract is one year renewable after its satisfactory evaluation and subject to the availability of resources.
- The mission is full-time and de facto excluded from any other engagement incompatible with this condition
- The Consultant is called upon to refrain from any situation that could put him or her in conflict of interest in the context of the mission assigned to him/her.

6. Selection procedures

6.1 Eligibility and qualifications

The ECOWAS Commission, through the Regional Agency for Agriculture and Food (RAAF) hereby invites natural persons to express their interest in providing the required services by providing information demonstrating that they possess the required qualifications and relevant experience to carry out the mission. Qualification and experience criteria better described in the terms of reference.

An interview to assess knowledge, skills and abilities may be arranged with the best candidates. Only shortlisted candidates will be contacted. For equal skills, female candidates will be privileged. RAAF reserves the right not to act on this advice.
